

Acts: We Don't Go Back, We Follow

Key Verses: Acts 2:42-47. Acts 8:1-4

Talk Summary:

- Are we getting back to normal? That's not how Jesus works, we don't go back, we follow. So how and where is Jesus leading us?
- The bible shows that God's Kingdom is always expanding, both in us and through us.
- So what might Jesus be doing? Has he been putting the spotlight on our own faith and discipleship?
- As God grows his children he builds his Church. This time of devotion (Acts 2:42-47) prepared them for what was to come, (Acts 8:1-4) the spontaneous expansion of the Church.
- History helps us see how God is in control and when his people trust him he can repurpose a crisis.
- We are going to remain responsive to God, responsive to feedback and the opportunities that God makes available.
- We want to prayerfully seize what this moment presents and have other Sunday Services in other locations. We are called to be a large, growing, missional, multisite church. We exist to help people follow Jesus, live life to the full and make a difference. Our vision is to start groups, communities and congregations where people can encounter God.
- How might Jesus be leading us through this time?
- Communion In a world that celebrates individuality we celebrate what we believe. In an age that
 avoids commitment, we pledge ourselves to a set of convictions and therefore we pledge ourselves
 to each other. At a time when accepted wisdom changes by the minute, we affirm that some truths
 are so timeless that they must be celebrated and declared again and again. In a world of
 uncertainty, we declare what is certain. So reciting a creed in our collective worship is a
 countercultural act.

A Celtic Creed

We believe in God above us, maker and sustainer of all life, of sun and moon, of water and earth, of male and female.

We believe in God beside us, Jesus Christ, the word made flesh, born of a woman, servant of the poor, tortured and nailed to a tree. A man of sorrows, he died forsaken.

He descended into the earth to the place of death.

On the third day he rose from the tomb.

He ascended into heaven, to be everywhere present, and His kingdom will come on earth.

We believe in God within us, the Holy Spirit of Pentecostal fire, life-giving breath of the Church, Spirit of healing and forgiveness, source of resurrection and of eternal life. Amen.

- What is most encouraging or challenging from the story in Acts?
- What do you think is the most crucial thing we can pray for our church and the Church in our nation at this time?
